WELCOME TO EVERYBODY

This is the fifth year of my editorship of the Daily Bulletin for the largest bridge tournament in the Southern Hemisphere and certainly one of the largest tournaments in the world. Time goes so rapidly as I recall my making my offer to Therese Tully to edit the Bulletin not quite knowing what I was taking on and simply hoping I was up to the job. Cut to 2012 where I am very comfortable with the process, procedures and most importantly in love with the tournament, its values and its prominent position on the world bridge calendar.

During my first two years I took on the job myself and I recall with horror the incredible pressure which that brought about. In 2009 the organisers, having regard for my sanity as well as sharing my vision for the importance of the Bulletin in the tournament, added Barry Rigal as an additional editor and in 2011 a third editor, John Carruthers was added.

With the ever-expanding size of the Bulletin, often the equivalent of 32 pages with normal margins (we use very narrow margins to save paper, and ultimately costs to you the player) and the expanding size of the tournament itself, the role of a third editor has become increasingly important. And so it is that this year we welcome Brent Manley from Memphis Tennessee, USA to the team. An introduction to Brent appears below and I trust that you will all make him feel welcome to our great tournament.

Welcome also this year to another good friend, Maurizio di Sacco. Maurizio holds senior position in the World Bridge Federation and European Bridge League and has joined us as a guest director.

This year sees a major change in the scheduling with no evening play during the teams on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. As a Bulletin Editor who normally gets to bed at 2:00am after putting the Bulletin to bed this is *marvellous* news. Now I know it is hard to satisfy everybody's needs and desires and that some would prefer to have the entire morning free and play bridge at night, while others would prefer to have no evening play at all. I believe that the organisers have found a VERY good solution with an 11:00am start and a scheduled 7:00pm but more likely 6:30pm finish allowing players to have social dinners, enjoy a drink and relax at their pace rather than rushing their dinners at 5:30 to be back for a 7:30 restart.

As part of this restructuring of the times our hard working organisers and behind the scenes helpers have put together an excellent social program.

Finally it is left to me to welcome you to this 51st staging of the tournament and to extend the best wishes of everybody associated with the event for a pleasant, enjoyable, social and successful tournament.

WELCOME TO BRENT MANLEY

Brent Manley lives in Memphis, Tennessee in the USA. While serving in the U.S. Army in 1970, members of his language school class (Vietnamese) in Texas took every available opportunity to play Bridge. Manley soon became the owner of Alfred Sheinwold's 5 Weeks to Winning Bridge allowing him to participate in the game. That was the beginning of a love affair with bridge that is just as intense now as it was 40 years ago.

In 1989 after twenty years in the newspaper business, Manley became aware that Frank Stewart had resigned as assistant editor of the American Contract Bridge League's Bridge Bulletin. Knowing the Editor Henry Francis, Manley contacted him about the opening and soon thereafter was appointed Assistant Editor.

In 1997 Manley was promoted to the position of editor on the retirement of Francis, a position he still holds. Under his stewardship the magazine changed format and became a significant colour bridge magazine.

Soon thereafter Manley became the Daily Bulletin Editor at the three annual American National Tournaments and in 2000 was invited by

the World Bridge Federation to be part of the Daily Bulletin staff at the World Championships, subsequently being named chief editor of the WBF Daily Bulletin, a position he still holds.

In tournament play, Manley is a Gold Life Master. He has authored six bridge books with another in the works and is editor of the recently released 7th edition of the Official Encyclopaedia of Bridge.

Manley's favourite non-bridge activity is running, and he has a goal of completing a marathon in all 50 of the U.S. states (as of November 2011, he has seven to go). He has been married to the former Donna Olsen, his favourite bridge partner, since 1992.


So if you see him around please say hi and make him feel welcome and that way he will leave Australia as an ambassador for our bridge scene and this tournament.

TEST YOURSELF DAY 1


This week's puzzles are going to be in a new and challenging format. The solution to each of the first seven day's puzzles will be a card or pair of cards. Keep a list of the solutions – because the prize puzzle in the final bulletin will include a deal where you'll need each one of those answers to crack the problem.

Let's start with a deal from the Knockout Teams from Pittsburgh a few years ago.



Opening Lead ♣4

You are West and start with the club four to dummy's king. Partner plays the \$7, using standard signals and South contributes the \$6. At trick two, North plays the \$Q, letting it ride to your king. How do you continue? Consider your answer before reading on.



At the table, Rich Rothwarf, playing with John Diamond, made the killing switch – the ◆9. Check out the complete deal to see why this precise shift was essential. If, for example, West had played the ◆A followed by the ◆9, East could win the ◆K, dropping South's queen, but then dummy's guarded ◆10 would remain as a stopper with East on lead. Similarly, if West plays a low diamond to the king and wins the return with the ace, declarer can play low on the nine, leaving West on play with no fourth diamond to lead.

However, the play of the diamond nine allowed East to win the king and return a low diamond to the queen and ace. Now West could lead the diamond three, while East sat poised over dummy's 10-6 of diamonds with the J-8, ready to take two tricks whichever diamond was played from dummy.

South should perhaps have played on hearts at trick two. If West had got on lead with the heart queen, it might not have been so clear as to whether to play spades or diamonds.

ENTRY FEES

Entry Fees – A few players, because of extenuating circumstances, have not been able to pre-pay their entry fee. If this means YOU, please proceed to Bridge Administration Desk and take care of the matter. Play cannot commence if an entry fee is unpaid.

- Open Seniors Intermediate Restricted or Novice Pairs \$280 per pair
- Open Seniors Intermediate Restricted or Novice Teams \$680 per team
- Ivy Dahler Butler Pairs \$180 per pair
- Mixed or Non-Mixed Teams \$240 per team
- Friday Novice Pairs \$120 per pair

Holiday Walk-ins \$15 per player are payable at the table at the commencement of the duplicate.

YOUTH, STUDENT & OTHER CONCESSIONAL ENTRY FEES-ADVISE WHEN ENTERING

- Courtesy of the Gold Coast Congress, all players born after 1st January 1992 are entitled to free entry.
- In accordance with Australian Bridge Federation policy, all players born between 1st January 1987 and 31st December 1991 are entitled to a 50% discount on entry fees.
- Courtesy of the Gold Coast Congress, all players born BEFORE 1st January 1912 are entitled to free entry.

PARKING

Parking will be available for \$10 per entry per day or \$50 for a weekly pass with unlimited entry from Saturday 25th February to Saturday 3rd March inclusive.

The Bridge Administration Desk is the **ONLY** place you can obtain a weekly pass and will be available from noon on Friday 24th February for use from Saturday onwards.

For those requiring casual day parking, a one entry one exit ticket will be available from the machine upon entry and you will need to pay \$10 on departure at the pay stations which are located at the lifts as you are exiting. Note that the \$10 ticket is a one entry and one exit ticket so if you intend to leave between sessions you will be required to pay a second \$10 parking fee.

EVENT INFORMATION AND ELIGIBILITY

OPEN: Carries ABF Open Playoff Points. Swiss Pairs do not carry playoff points

SENIORS: Open to players born prior to 1st January 1954 and carries ABF Senior Playoff Points

INTERMEDIATE: Open to players who have not attained 500 MP's as at 30th September 2011.

RESTRICTED: Open to players who have not attained 300 MP's as at 30th September 2011.

NOVICE: Open to players who have not attained 100 MP's as at 30th September 2011.

MIXED TEAMS: Each pair must comprise one player of each gender at each table for ALL matches

NON-MIXED: Any team not comprising one male playing with one female at each table each session.

For clarity there are NO restrictions on the Non-Mixed Teams you simply need 4 people at

the table and their gender is immaterial.

OVERSEAS ELIGIBILITY

NOVICE: NZ Juniors as at January 1st 2012

RESTRICTED: NZ Intermediate as at January 1st 2012

INTERMEDIATE: NZ Open with no more than 100A Points & 400B Points as at January 1st 2012

TEAM CATEGORIES

All teams should have nominated their category when submitting their entry. The lists of categories received will be published at various points around the Convention Centre.

Please check to see you are entered correctly into the various categories as once winners are announced no correspondence will be entered into.

SUNDAY EVENING SESSION OF PAIRS

PRIZES FOR THE BEST DRESSED IN THE BLACK AND WHITE THEME

We encourage all players to dress formally – just as they did fifty years ago - for the Second session of the Pairs Final Sunday night. The theme is black and white with tuxedos & long dresses being the order of the day as are suits or jackets and ties. But if this is not your thing then any black and white to make it festive would add to the evening.

IVY DAHLER SWISS PAIRS - SCORING

The Open Swiss Butler Pairs is run with distinct NS and EW fields. Although the event is scored by the normal Victory Point scale, the effect of the two field format is that the average score may not be the same for NS as it is for EW. The Ivy Dahler Shield will be awarded to the pair with the highest percentage total Victory Points, relative to the average in their direction.

NOVICE EVENTS

Help will be on hand for one hour before start of play for all novice & restricted events. Assistance will be available for filling out system cards, helping you find your seat & working out where you go & where the boards move etc. We can also assist with any queries re alerting or anything else you might like to know.

WITHDRAWALS

Players are permitted to withdraw from all divisions of the Barometer pairs (Open, Senior, Intermediate, Restricted and Novice) event (Sunday 26th February and Monday 27th February) at the end of the qualifying rounds provided that they notify the Chief Director or Bridge Administration Desk within **ONE HOUR** of the qualifying scores being posted. No portion of the entry fees will be refunded.

If you do not feel well and require a substitute, see the Bridge Administration Desk. Please use this service only when essential.

Our Floor Managers, Marj, Chris, Kim and Amber are dressed with the white overshirt. Our Caddies are in purple however they are only here to caddy – see Marj, Chris, Kim or Amber if further assistance is required. Our Directors led by Laurie Kelso have the blue shirts.

Our Scoring Staff led by Matthew McManus are in the Black Schweppes shirts. However scoring issues should be addressed with the Scoring Enquiries DESK outside the scoring centre towards the back wall in the centre of the playing area.

DINNER DANCE - NUMBERS ARE LIMITED SO - TO AVOID DISAPPOINTMENT - DON'T DELAY

This year's Dinner Dance will be held in the Gold Coast Convention Centre on Saturday 3rd March. Doors will be open at 8:00pm with pre-dinner drinks from 7:30pm. As in the past, entry to this event is by ticket only and the onus is on the individual to make arrangements. The procedure is to pick up a "table list" from the Bridge Administration Desk and return it as soon as possible and prior to 8:00pm Wednesday. Tables will accommodate a maximum of ten people and list can be for any number from 1 to 10. Regrettably it is simply not possible to accommodate tables for more than ten people.

For those playing in **BOTH** major events (Pairs and Teams), the dinner dance is free, for those playing in one major event (**Pairs or Teams**) the cost is \$35.00. For those only playing in the events at the end of the week (**Friday/Saturday**) the cost is \$60.00. For those playing in **NO** events, the cost is \$70. These charges are payable at the time of handing in the list to the bridge administration desk. Tickets will be available for collection from 15:00 Friday afternoon.

WHAT'S NEW THIS YEAR

- A calendar of social events ranging from Trivia evenings through Yoga and Karaoke Evenings to Fashion Parades. A full schedule is contained in this and subsequent bulletins.
- No Night Play in Teams: Play commences at 11am on Tuesday, Wednesday & Thursday and will finish by 7pm (earlier if you are quick!)
- Holiday Walk in Pairs: There are now walk-in sessions EVERY day of the Gold Coast Congress -Saturday 25th through Saturday 3rd March. You can play in as many or as few as you like at a cost of just \$15.00 per session.

There is no need to pre-enter – just turn up and pay at the table. As an incentive these sessions have been grouped into three competitions where players will qualify for an overall prize if they play in each of the three sessions of that competition.

- The first group of three session starts at 1pm on Saturday 25th and continues on Sunday 26th & Monday 27th.

SYSTEM CARDS HOW AND WHY - PART 1 THE OUTSIDE


It is important to understand that bridge is a game of disclosure and not obfuscation. The intent is to tell as much to your opponents as you and your partner know about your methods. The place where this begins is the system card. While some players are dismissive of the need to FULLY complete system cards they serve two very good functions:

- provide COMPLETE and MEANINGFUL information to the opponents regarding your methods; and
- system card serve as a good reminder of things you and your partner should have agreed on before the tournament.

Here is a guide to help you complete the card. Firstly you should be aware that there is a program which allows you to complete the card on your computer and print it in its completed form. To download the program, go to www.abf.com.au. Some basic abbreviations you would be aware of:

M = Majors	HCP = High card Points	G/F = Game Force	WK = Weak
m = minors	PEN = Penalties	F1 = Forcing 1 Round	STR = Strong
SPL = Splinter	T/O = Takeout	NNF = Natural Not Forcing


Many players/Partnerships only fill in the front of the card finding the inside of the card has too much detail in it. However we would urge you to complete both sides of the card as it will reinforce the methods between you and your partner.



Basic System should be an excellent guide to your opponents as to your methods. You might like to consider Standard, 2/1 meaning a new suit at the two level after partner opens is forcing to game, Precision or Strong Club. The colour classification for your system is set by the ABF and Tournament Regulations. If you are unsure refer to a director for help.



In this section we are describing our opening bids. This together with leads and signals is what your opponents will be most interested in. Try to add as much information as you can. For example where there is space add your bids over 2^{\blacktriangledown} , 2^{\blacktriangle} and 2NT as above.



In this section you are trying to draw your opponent's attention to bids or plays that might be "unexpected" and which they may wish to discuss before the match begins.



This is another section that will be of interest to your opponents as it describes what happens in competition. Notice the use of DONT over 1NT, you can use <u>popular</u> names of conventions to save describing them – your opponents will ask if they don't understand.

Bridge is a game of disclosure and you play a big part in that.

In this section you show your slam bidding methods add the names of any conventions that you use. Make sure you put in ALL of your conventions.

Tomorrow we will look at completing the inside of the card.

USING THE BRIDGEMATES

This year at the Gold Coast Congress, the Bridgemate2 units will be used at all tables for all events. Bridgemates are a wireless scoring device, with the players transmitting scores from the table to the scoring room immediately a board has been played. This will mean that the results for all sessions should be available very soon after the last card is played.

There will be instructions on how to use the Bridgemate on every table. What follows is a summary of what you need to do and what you need to look out for. More detail can be found on the table instructions.

• The Bridgemate will regularly turn itself off in order to conserve power. If the screen is blank at any time, just press OK to power it up again. Any details already entered will be retained.

- After each board is played, you need to enter:
 - the board number
 - the contract and declarer
 - the number of tricks (result)

The Bridgemate will then calculate the score, which will be displayed as the score for NS.

Normally NS should take charge of entering the details. It is most important that the opponents (EW) verify that the score is correct, then press the button, **ACCEPT** to confirm it.

NB: This becomes the official score for your table for this board, so please ensure its accuracy. At any time you can check the scores already entered, by means of the button, **SCORES**. Any errors can be corrected by the players via the button, **CORREC**. (Note: the button for **ACCEPT**, **SCORES** and **CORREC** are all at the top right hand side of the keypad).

After each result is confirmed, the number of boards still to be entered will be displayed. At the end of a round, the Bridgemate will display "End of Round", meaning that you have entered all the scores for the round. Until you get this message, no scores can be entered for the next round. If you are not sure what boards you still have to enter, enter 55 as the board number and you will see the board numbers still to be scored.

At the end of a round, please use the SCORES button to check that the results you have entered are all correct.

Tables which fail to enter all their scores will be the main reason for the results of a session being delayed, or for later score corrections needing to be made. From experience, many players get up from the table after playing the last board and don't bother entering and confirming the score. Please don't be one of them!

CORRECTING SCORES

After each session, a printout of the results for each pair or team will be made available. For the last session of a stage of an event, they will be placed in baskets next to the notice board where the results of your section or event are posted. For all other sessions, they will be placed on your table before or during the next session.

If you believe that there is a mistake, you need to follow this procedure:

- 1. on the board where you believe that there was an error, agree with your opponents that the score was entered incorrectly;
- 2. make the correction on your printout and have them sign it;
- 3. give the corrected printout to the Scoring Liaison Officer, Toni Bardon, under the sign "SCORING ENQUIRIES" next to the Scoring Room. She will check that you have provided all the necessary information. The correction will be made by the scorers during the following session and a new personal printout will be made available for you to collect.

Agreed scoring errors need to be advised within the scoring correction period for the session in which the error occurred. The scoring correction periods are displayed prominently near the scoreboards and are also on the back of the Bridgemate instructions on each table (*Ed: and in this Bulletin*). At the conclusion of the scoring correction period, scores become final and, under the Laws of Bridge, no further changes can be made.

PLAYER NUMBERS FOR THE TEAMS USING BRIDGEMATE II

During the teams events, when you turn on the Bridgemates, you will be asked to enter your player numbers. **This is NOT your ABF number**. Each player in every team has been assigned a number. These will be found on the bright orange sheet which will be on your table at the start of play. NS at the home table should enter the player numbers for the players **in your own team**.

The reason for this is that, if done correctly, the scoring team will produce a summary of the results for each pair in your team, comparing their results against the average score across your section on each board (the datum). These results have no official status and are just for your own interest. It is a service we are happy to be able to provide, but in order to take advantage of it, it is important that the player numbers are accurately entered each round.

SYSTEMS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Each pair are required to have two current ABF approved, systemically identical system cards on the table for the opposing pair before the start of each round. Additional WBF system cards may also be brought to the table.

GREEN, BLUE and RED systems as well as BROWN Sticker conventions may be used during the Open Pairs, Senior's Pairs, Intermediate Pairs and Ivy Dahler Swiss Pairs subject to protection (note: protection will not be available for the major final of the Open Pairs).

Only GREEN and BLUE systems may be used during the Restricted Pairs, Novice Pairs, Ivy Dahler Restricted Swiss Pairs and Novice Teams.

GREEN, BLUE and RED systems as well as BROWN Sticker conventions are permitted in the Restricted Teams (with protection) as well as the Intermediate, Mixed and Non-Mixed Teams.

YELLOW systems will not be permitted in the Seniors/Intermediate/Restricted/Novice/Mixed/Non-Mixed Teams or any Pairs event; or during the first two rounds of the Open Swiss Teams. Thereafter the use of YELLOW systems is not permitted against teams with a current position in the lower two thirds of the Open field (decimals rounded up).

Teams proposing to use YELLOW systems must provide an adequate copy of their system (including a *bona fide* suggested defence) to the CTD before 11:00 am on Tuesday 28th February 2012. Such systems will be made available for inspection.

For teams wishing to use YELLOW systems, and in addition to the ABF card, a WBF system card (with not more than 2 supplementary A4 sheets, typed or written in black ink on one side) is mandatory.

BROWN STICKER

Some overcalls and 2-level openings attract a BROWN sticker. Weak 2-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO & Myxo Twos, etc) are BROWN sticker - pairs should attach BROWN spots to their cards. Also, multi one-level overcalls are BROWN, though gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 1♣ are not. Please also note that a Multi 2♦ (or 2♣) showing a Weak Two in either major is another exemption from the BROWN Sticker category. This is largely academic since BROWN Sticker is permitted in everything except the Restricted Pairs and the Novice Events.

PROTECTED PAIRS

Pairs playing a GREEN system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below Life Master or one is below State Master. This affords protection from BROWN Sticker conventions in Pairs events and in the Restricted Teams.

ALERTS - SUMMARY

PRE-ALERTS

List your unusual or complex treatments in the pre-alerts section of the system card. For instance – RCO 2s, Bergen raises, DONT Dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc).

ALERTS DURING THE AUCTION

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

DON'T ALERT:

Any double or redouble

Any call beyond 3NT, except a conventional opening bid

A bid of a suit bid or shown by an opponent

Any 2♣ response to a INT opening bid (e.g. Stayman)

For our New Zealand players We do NOT use STOP Cards We do NOT announce the range of NT openings

DO ALERT:

All other conventional calls (such as *Transfers*, a 1♣ opening that could be a *doubleton*, 2♥=hearts and *a minor*)

'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).

IF PARTNER STUFFS UP

Declarer/Dummy: If partner fails to alert or provides a wrong or misleading explanation, you should wait until the **end of the auction** before calling the Director and correcting. **Defenders**: wait until the **end of the hand** before piping up.

PLAYING TOO MANY CONVENTIONS

Brent Manley

It's exciting to learn how the language of bridge works, and it's natural to admire the established pairs who seem to have something in their bidding systems to cope with every "problem" that arises.

You look at the convention card of an expert pair, players with seemingly every space taken up with some notation about a convention in use, and you think that the more gadgets you can "acquire" the better off you will be.

Don't believe it.

In your early development, you will be far better off concentrating on your card play – learning how to take tricks – than you will be by adding every known convention to your repertoire.

Here are some reasons for going slowly in the convention department:

- 1. It takes time to grasp all the nuances of any new convention. Whenever you and your regular partner decide to add a new agreement, you should discuss the tool thoroughly. What if the opponents interfere? At what level is it "off?" What does it mean if you don't use the convention?
- 2. When you are starting out, you already have a lot to think about at the table as declarer and when you are defending, trying to learn to count the high-card points and the opponents' hands. How will you manage all this if you also have to try to remember a couple of dozen conventions you don't fully understand?
- 3. Some gadgets are brilliant in conception but not very useful because opportunities to use them occur so rarely. Trying to keep everything straight in your mind uses energy better spent on more mundane but highly important tasks such as deciding on an opening lead or figuring out a way to make a tough contract. Other conventions use bids that sound so natural that a "forget" is not unusual.

4. Many years ago, my partner and I added Smolen to our system: Partner opens 1NT, you bid 2♣ (Stayman) and partner responds 2♠ (no major). If you have five of one major and four of the other and enough for game, you jump in your four-card suit so partner can still be declarer if you have an eight-card fit. The first four times my partner used it, the bid sounded so natural that I just passed. Oops!

Not that long ago, Jeff Meckstroth and Eric Rodwell – one of the world's top pairs – decided that it was time to make a significant reduction in the size of their system notes. The two have fashioned an amazingly complex and effective bidding system, and they almost never have "forgets," but at one point Meckstroth appealed to his partner to cut down on the agreements because it was getting harder and harder to remember everything.

If a pair like Meckwell can decide that less is more, it makes sense for aspiring players to follow suit.



South opens 4♥ and all pass. West leads the ♣A, followed by the ♣2, which you win with the ♣10. On the ♣K South follows and West plays the ♦6, even card discouraging. What do you play at trick four?



Datum (average) on this deal from a national selection event was N-S scoring 590. At one table West made 5♦ for +600 (+15 lmps). Another West was in 6♦ doubled for -200 (+9 lmps) and one West was in 5♣ doubled after an auction which is definitely not for the fainthearted for -1700 (-15 lmps).

The other five tables played in a heart game, all making. Four made 680 on a diamond lead. At two tables the bidding went:

West North East South

4♥

Pass Pass Pass

When West led the ◆K and declarer soon had twelve tricks and +3 Imps. At the other table West appreciated the value of the ♥J-x-x and started with the ♣A. He struck gold and continued clubs. East won trick 2 with the ♣10 and cashed the ♣K. On this West discarded the ◆6, a discouraging signal: 'Don't play diamonds.'

East should continue with the fourth club to defeat 4♥. In practice East switched to the ◆A despite partner's signal. Declarer ruffed and soon scored +620. You can see what East was thinking: 'I'll cash the ◆A and then play the fourth club, but trusting partner is high priority.

Please hail the bus. They will have a sign Gold Coast Congress Bus in front left hand windscreen.


