HAVE YOU DISCUSSED?

I tried an experiment for the Daily Bulletins in San Francisco last fall. I wrote articles for the page devoted to new players and, to make the point that bridge should always be fun, I started every article off with a weird, unusual or just plain funny story. The response was unexpectedly positive, so I'm trying the same thing on my second trip to Australia.

The stories might not always be relevant to the topic for discussion, but they should at least amuse.

The late Harold Levitt had the kind of wit that usually hit the nail on the head. Here is one of his astute observations: "Playing bridge without a system is like winking at a girl in the dark. You know what you're doing, but nobody else does."

If you and your partner fail to discuss your agreements thoroughly, you may find yourself winking in the dark.

For example, you may have decided to play a certain defence against the opponents' 1NT openers. In the U.S. Marty Bergen's DONT convention has many followers in part because of its simplicity. DONT is one of many schemes for competing against 1NT openers.

But what if the opponents are playing a "weak" 1NT opening? Do you use the same system? Many experts vary the system to be able to double directly to show a good hand (usually 14 or more high-card points).

Alert! Important point ahead!

Before you start thinking about an alternative system for "weak" 1NT openers, you and partner must define "weak." I have seen many experienced players using their weak 1NT takeout system when partner considered the opener to have been in the "strong" category.

Agree on the definition before you adopt a second system to compete against it. A range such as 10-12 is easy to define as weak, but what about 11-14, 13-15 and even 14-17? What's best for competing is less important than agreement between you and your partner about the range for strong and for weak.

Another important topic for discussion is continuations by advancer (the partner of the overcaller). What if advancer has a good hand? Many pairs play that all good hands (i.e., worth opening bid) start with 2NT. This will come up more against the weaker 1NT openers but it's handy to have in your arsenal for all occasions. It's frustrating to miss a game because of the opponents' methods.

It would also be helpful to discuss the kinds of hands you will have when you enter the auction. The Rule of 8, a guideline created by Mel Colchamiro of New York, can help - when deciding whether to enter the auction over a strong 1NT opener, take the number of cards in your two long suits and subtract the total number of losers in your hand (one loser for each missing ace, king and queen in a suit of three cards or longer; low doubletons have two losers, singletons one, voids none). If the answer is zero or one, pass. If the answer is 2 or higher, get in there. It becomes the Rule of 8 with the stipulation that the overcaller must have at least 6 high-card points to get involved.

While you are discussing competing against strong openings, decide on a defence to the artificial Precision 1. opening (or indeed any strong 1.). There are many gadgets for this task, but simple is best, at least at the start. The easiest to work with is Mathe: Double shows the majors, 1NT shows the minors. Other bids are natural.

Continuing with the thought, you can use the same defence against the strong 2* opener, but there is more risk involved because you have to start a level higher. The system chosen is less important than both partners' *being on the same page.*

EARN A CHOCOLATE FROG

The headmaster of Sydney Grammar School, Alastair Mackerras was famous for his habit of handing out chocolate frogs to any boy whose name he could not remember. As he reputedly had a very good memory, this does not seem to have led to as many pimples as you might expect. I should also say he generously handed them out for acts of kindness.

Thanks to the generosity of Jay Faranda we can go down a similar path and give out chocolate frogs to any player who displays notable courtesy, ethics or equanimity as well as the person who nominates the recipient. OK I had to admit the need to look up equanimity- calmness of mind or temper; composure.

To encourage more such acts your editor has undertaken to sponsor additional chocolate frogs should the proposed supply run out!!!

Before we look at the point of the deal, some thoughts on the auction. North should take the opportunity to show his four-card spade suit at the one-level. After South rebids one no-trump, North is too strong to bid a mere two diamonds; so he should jump to three suggesting invitational values. South's hand is then good enough to bid game.

Your club lead goes to the jack, king and three, back comes the club eight to South's nine. Plan the defence.

Line 1: $\forall A$, $\forall K$, $\forall Q$, pitching a diamond loser. Next came the A, a club ruff and a diamond to the ace. North switched to the A, K and declarer had a club to lose, nine tricks.

Line 2: ♥A, ♥K, ♥Q, pitching a diamond loser, followed by a low diamond, won by the ♦9. North cashed ♠A, ♠K, ♦A, ruffed by West. There was no way to avoid a club loser later. One down.

The winning line is just a matter of timing: Take trick one with the ♥J or a high heart in dummy. Play ♣A, ruff a club, heart to the ace, ruff a club, discard a diamond on the third heart and lead the ♣J.

Best defence beats 4♠ even if you do not find the diamond switch. A top spade is certainly the best lead. It will not cost a trick and will allow you to see dummy before deciding on your next move. Continue with the ♠K. A diamond shift works but looks very risky. You still beat 4♠ if you switch to a heart or the ♣Q even if you do not find the diamond lead

Although the event is scored by the normal Victory Point scale, the effect of the two field format is that the average score may not be the same for NS as it is for EW. The Ivy Dahler Shield will be awarded to the pair with the highest percentage total Victory Points, relative to the average in their direction.

ROOM SETUP - COLOUR CODING

For the whole event, the Open Area will be dressed up in light and dark blue, the Intermediate in bronze and cream while the Restricted will be in green and dark green, the Novice and Rookies in yellow and the Seniors in pink and lilac. Coloured flags will identify your section results and playing areas.

Rookie and Opening Swiss Pairs will be played on the tables with orange tablecloths.

BRIDGEMATES

If you have never used the Bridgemate Scoring Units we suggest you arrive a few minutes before your first session and ask a Director for a quick tutorial. We are confident that your opponents will also help to use this user friendly technology.

PLAYER NUMBERS FOR THE TEAMS USING BRIDGEMATE II

During the team events, when you turn on the Bridgemates, you will be asked to enter your player numbers. This is NOT your ABF number. Each player in every team has been assigned a number. These will be found on the bright orange sheet which will be on your table at the start of play. NS at the home table should enter the player numbers for the players in your own team.

The reason for this is that, if done correctly, the scoring team will produce a summary of the results for each pair in your team, comparing their results against the average score across your section on each board (the datum). These results have no official status and are just for your own interest. It is a service we are happy to be able to provide, but in order to take advantage of it, it is important that the player numbers are accurately entered each round.

NEW for 2013: Our observations from recent years show that over 90% of teams sit in the same seats for the whole event. To simplify the process for entering player numbers for these teams, from Round 2 onwards if your team is sitting in the same seats as in Round 1, you may just enter "1" for all four players. The unit will display "as for Round 1" as the player names and the system will correctly record the pairs.

NEW FEATURE ON WEB RESULTS PAGE

On the 2013 GCC Results Page, http://www.qldbridge.com/gcc/results2013.php, there is a new option, "Individual Player Results." Click on this and enter your surname or ABF number (or anyone else whose results you may be interested in). You will now see a list of every session in which you played at the 2013 GCC, your score, the number of masterpoints won, and a link to your scorecard for the session. (This page will be updated at the end of each day's play.)

WHAT'S NEW THIS YEAR

• Holiday Walk in Pairs: There are now walk-in sessions starting on Tuesday 26th February through Saturday 2nd March. You can play in as many or as few as you like at a cost of just \$15.00 per session.

There is no need to pre-enter – just turn up and pay at the table. As an incentive these sessions have been grouped into two competitions where players will qualify for an overall prize if they play in each of the three sessions of that competition.

- Tropical dress up Night, Sunday 24th February we had such fun last year we are doing it again!
- Matchpoint Swiss Pairs 3 sessions no night play
- Monday One day Swiss Butler Pairs no night play.
- Teams to start at 10:30am
- Rookie Bridge i.e. Less than 10 Masterpoint event Sunday and Thursday. Play one or both sessions.
- Eligibility for Intermediate events raised to less than 750 MPs.

CORRECTING SCORES

After each session, a printout of the results for each pair or team will be made available. For the last session of a stage of an event, they will be placed in baskets next to the notice board where the results of your section or event are posted. For all other sessions, they will be placed on your table before or during the next session.

If you believe that there is a mistake, you need to follow this procedure:

- 1. on the board where you believe that there was an error, agree with your opponents that the score was entered incorrectly;
- 2. make the correction on your printout and have them sign it;
- 3. give the corrected printout to the Scoring Liaison Officer, Toni Bardon, under the sign "SCORING ENQUIRIES" next to the Scoring Room. She will check that you have provided all the necessary information. The correction will be made by the scorers during the following session and a new personal printout will be made available for you to collect.

Agreed scoring errors need to be advised within the scoring correction period for the session in which the error occurred. The scoring correction periods are displayed prominently near the scoreboards. At the conclusion of the scoring correction period, scores become final and, under the Laws of Bridge, no further changes can be made.

SYSTEMS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Each pair is required to have two current ABF approved, systemically identical system cards on the table for the opposing pair before the start of each round. Additional WBF system cards may also be brought to the table.

GREEN, BLUE and RED systems as well as BROWN Sticker conventions may be used during the Open Pairs and Teams, Seniors Pairs and Teams, Intermediate Pairs and Teams, Mixed Teams, Friday Teams and Ivy Dahler Open Swiss Pairs, subject to protection. (Note: protection will not be available for the major final of the Open Pairs).

Only GREEN and BLUE systems may be used during the Restricted Pairs and Teams, Novice Pairs and Teams, Rookie Novice Pairs, Friday Novice Pairs and Ivy Dahler Restricted Swiss Pairs.

YELLOW systems will only be permitted in the Open Teams from Round 3 onwards and not against teams with a current position in the lower two thirds of the field (decimals rounded up).

Teams proposing to use YELLOW systems must lodge an adequate copy of their system (including a bona fide suggested defence) with the CTD before 10:00am on Tuesday 26th February 2013. Such systems will be made available for inspection.

BROWN STICKER

Some overcalls and 2-level openings attract a BROWN sticker. Weak 2-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO & Myxo Twos, etc) are BROWN sticker. Pairs should attach BROWN spots to their cards. Also, multi one-level overcalls are BROWN, though gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 14 are not. Please also note that a Multi 24 (or 24) showing a Weak Two in either major is an exemption from the BROWN Sticker category.

PROTECTED PAIRS

Pairs playing a GREEN system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below Life Master or one is below State Master. This affords protection from BROWN Sticker conventions in all events where they are permitted with the exception of the major Final of the Open Pairs.

ALERTS - SUMMARY

PRE-ALERTS

List your unusual or complex treatments in the pre-alerts section of the system card. For instance – RCO 2s, Bergen raises, DONT Dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc).

ALERTS DURING THE AUCTION

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

DON'T ALERT:

Any double or redouble Any call beyond 3NT, except a conventional opening bid A bid of a suit *bid or shown* by an opponent Any 2♣ response to a INT opening bid (*e.g. Stayman*) For our New Zealand players We do **NOT** use STOP Cards We do **NOT** announce the range of NT openings

DO ALERT:

All other conventional calls (such as *Transfers*, a 1♣ opening that could be a *doubleton*, 2♥=hearts and *a minor*)

'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).

IF PARTNER STUFFS UP

Declarer/Dummy: If partner fails to alert or provides a wrong or misleading explanation, you should wait until the *end of the auction* before calling the Director and correcting. **Defenders**: wait until the *end of the hand* before piping up.

ROLE OF THE DIRECTOR Laurie Kelso

The duties performed by directors at this congress are not dissimilar to what happens in your local club. The Gold Coast Congress is simply a different order of magnitude!

The Laws say that, "The Director is responsible for the on-site technical management of the tournament." When the Laws say 'Director' they really mean the 'Director in Charge'. Among the Director's duties are requirements to:

- Ensure the orderly progress of the game.
- Administer and interpret the Laws and advise the players of their rights and responsibilities.
- Rule upon and (sometimes) adjust disputes.


The scale of this event requires a number of directors, scorers and floor managers all performing various different duties. While the Laws allow for delegation, they do not relieve the Director in Charge of any of the ultimate responsibility. So if I appear to be preoccupied or distracted at times during the week – there is probably a good reason!

The bus will run every 10 - 15 mins traffic permitting, commencing one hour before the start of play for each session (but not walk-ins), picking up passengers at the listed stops in numerical order.
