At some point Moore, playing the enthusiastic young subaltern during the Second World War is told by Cook, the snooty officer: "Perkins, you know how sometimes in a game of soccer when a player gets injured and reduces his team to 10, the 10 play better than 11. Perkins, we want you to be that 11th man!"

I had been led to believe I was going to be that 11th man, but some unspecified family emergency led to my kitting up to play round five.

The match against Andi ad Steve Boughey started well:

It was very hard for our opponents to get this right; West's 3NT looks a reasonable gamble (she knew her RHO didn't have that great a hand) and whether the defenders led a heart or a club, ducked, the penalty was 500. Teammates sold out to 2♥ and collected +100 to give us a very healthy start.

Both Norths opened a strong no-trump and played there. On the lead of the  $\blacklozenge$ 5 declarer should cover with the seven perhaps (the rule of 11 gives West the knowledge that declarer has only one diamond higher than the lead, but splitting from dummy might suggesting an honour not the six? Andi did very well to put in the nine, then cashed the king, Steve following with the four. If this is suit preference (yes it should be) then West must shift to hearts to put East in. We escaped with +90 when Andi played a spade, but that was still a loss of one IMP when in the other room the first diamond went to West's  $\blacklozenge$ K.

After West's opening bid of 1♦ was passed round to South, (wouldn't you respond 1♠ as East?) what action would you recommend? As you can see, 5♣ is cold with dummy producing, inter alia, the key doubleton diamond. My choice of 3NT might have backfired, but West not unnaturally led a low heart and that was ten tricks for 630. In retrospect, could you make an argument for the ♥A at trick one; the spade shift would then become obvious. Datum here was 330 to N/S.

Another difficult hand: after 1 - 4 you might pass as North if South had 3NT available as a good 4 raise. But our partnership play 3NT as an unspecified shortness and 8-12, so David Appleton did not have that inference. He used keycard and drove to slam, and found me with the wrong shortage, and not quite enough homes for his heart loser. Jones and Millington stopped in 4 after the same sort of start, to make the set score 21-12. Most of the field got this right, with the datum 370 to N/S.

1♣ was Polish, 2♦ was game-forcing, and Morgan showed clubs and extras, then hearts, then supported diamonds. Fischer used keycard for diamonds and then showed the club king, letting Fischer drive to 7♦.

After a system accident (OK I forgot the system) had gifted the opponents 7 IMPs, the match action basically came to an end, with the good guys leading by 20 IMPs.


## **OPEN TEAMS QUALIFYING ROUND 6**

Two of the teams at the very top of the table clashed when Buchen met Braun. At the table I was watching it would be Stock/Yuen taking on Milne Griffiths, while Buchen/Thomson were taking on Hung/Lazar.

Against 2♥ Griffiths led two top diamonds then underled in clubs for the defenders to cash three tricks there. Milne played the 13th club and declarer ruffed in dummy and misguessed the heart queen. In the other room the defenders did not cash the clubs, and Andy Hung located the ♥Q for +140, to give his side a 5-0 lead.




The field played 6♥ here, and the clubs lay in such a way that it was almost impossible not to make 12 tricks. Griffiths-Milne had a problem when a key-card response was doubled:

2NT- 3♣-3♥-3♠-4♣-4NT-5♦-(Dbl)-Pass- Rdbl-5♠-5NT-6♣-7♥.

Griffiths opened a 19-21 2NT, showed hearts, then made a serious slam try over the 3¢ call, which set hearts as trumps and showed a slam try. After the 5¢ response was doubled, no one really knew who had shown what, but it looks to me as if Milne was simply hoping for the perfect hand opposite. But neither player exactly held back.

If that was culpable, this was surely simply unlucky:



Buchen/Thompson played 3NT for 690, but Milne found his way to the best slam, since he could perhaps test the side suits before playing clubs. Nick Stock did very well to lead the ♥10. Milne sensibly decided not to play

to ruff a diamond in dummy for fear of a bad break. After the weak 2♥ call he simply drew trumps and then led ♣A and another club, for down one.

If my reading of the record is right, precisely three pairs made slam without the club lead. Pam and Ross Crichton, and Matt Smith playing with Jamie Thompson made slam on the lead of the diamond queen, while Gheorghi Belonogov and Stephen Cox brought home the slam after the lead of the heart 10. Curiously two of the three pairs, gained only one IMP for their result, their teammates (yes we know who you are!) having sacrificed in 5♥ for -1400 when North took the advance sacrifice facing a preemptive opener.

Buchen led 27-5 as a result of this swing, and picked up another 7 IMPs on the following deal.

Stock's disciplined pass in first chair led to Yuen playing 2♠. Yuen ruffed the diamond lead and unblocked in hearts, then played a club to the jack and king. Milne returned a club for his partner to ruff, and Griffith played a low trump to the queen and ace. Declarer now cross-ruffed diamonds and hearts, and ended with the two top spades, two hearts, and four ruffs for 110. In the other room Lazar opened 1♦ and played 3NT on the lead of the ♥Q. The contact had some sort of play if spades broke, but -200 was the best Hung could do as the cards lay.

Braun bought the contract in both rooms unsuccessfully on the next deal, and Buchen's lead was up to 34 at 39-5.

Finally Braun caught a break:

In the room I was watching, Yuen reached 3NT after treating his hand as a balanced 20-22, and seeing Stock use Stayman. Milne guessed well to lead a low spade. Declarer crossed to a heart and tried to duck a diamond to his LHO. But Griffiths won and cashed out the spades, then shifted to a club for four down 400. In the other room Lazar also received a spade lead to the queen and ace, and ducked a diamond. Here, however East decided it might be a good moment to underlead his spade king; results proved him wrong. That meant +630 and 14 IMPs to Braun.

Braun also picked up the final swing of the match here.

Yuen led a deceptive ◆5 against 2♠. Declarer ducked a spade, and now Yuen gave his partner a ruff, got in with the club ace and gave his partner a second ruff. But now Griffiths could win the heart ace and draw all the remaining trumps, then ran the diamonds to pitch one of the losers from dummy. In the other room Buchen played 3NT after a 15-17 no-trump, but Hung had doubled a heart transfer, so Lazar led ♥K and shifted to diamonds at trick two. 3NT has plenty of play, but with both club honours offside there was no chance today. Braun collected 7 IMPs and reduced the final margin to 13 IMPs to Buchen.

## RESTRICTED TEAMS QUALIFYING MATCHES 5 AND 7 TOMORROW'S ANOTHER DAY

In bridge, as in life, things don't always work out the way you want them to, but wise players don't turn their backs on the greatest game because of a bit of bad fortune. They return to the tables with enthusiasm and they have fun. Tomorrow might be the day for a breakthrough.

Such was the case on Wednesday with the team captained by Glenda Parmenter. She and her teammates – all from the Armidale (NSW) Bridge Club – had a few disappointments in the Restricted Teams qualifying, but Parmenter and her partner,

Barb O'Shea – along with their teammates, Julie and Kevin Willcocks – played well in the penultimate set on Wednesday and had no apologies to make for the results.

In round five, O'Shea and Parmenter started off against Jeanette Chatterton and Dawn Simpson, playing on a team from Rangiora, South Island, New Zealand. Their teammates were Suzette McIroy and Junette McIntyre.

The Aussie team started with a good result, scoring plus 100 against an ambitious 4. that might have made. The Willcocks stopped in 3. to score plus 140 for a 6-IMP gain.

It was a different story on board 2.

Should O'Shea have blasted into the spade game? Probably. Conventional wisdom in IMP events is that you should bid any close vulnerable game because the payoff is so much better than the minus you get for going

down. There's also the consideration that the opponents might well be bidding it at the other table, so down one could be a push. On this occasion, bidding 3**\Phi** for plus 170 meant a 10-IMP loss because North-South at the other table bid the making game.

On Board 4, Parmenter took the bull by the horns and bid a vulnerable game for a 10-IMP swing for her team. At the other table, North-South stopped in 3♣, making six. This was the action at Parmenter's table.

Chatterton led her singleton trump. Parmenter played the queen and played a second round of trumps before playing a low heart from hand. Chatterton played low and Parmenter called for the king. She lost only a heart and a spade for plus 600.

The next board produced yet another swing for the New Zealand team, thanks to a good bid by Simpson.

Simpson's 2♦ opener showed a strong hand with eight or more tricks. Chatterton bid 2♥, meant to ask about her partner's suit. Simpson's leap to game told her partner that the suit had been located.

O'Shea led the ♠Q to dummy's ace and Chatterton was soon claiming plus 450, losing only a spade and a club. East-West at the other table stopped in 3♥, scoring 10 tricks for a 7-IMP loss. The match ended with a 49-20 win for Chatterton.

In the sixth qualifying match, Parmenter and company faced a team led by Pauline Lane (Robyn Stanhope, Helen Little and Lydia Hockings). In a low-scoring set, Lane prevailed 23-11.

That brought Parmenter to the match seven, against the Anne Riley team.

At the table with Parmenter and O'Shea were Carol Hocking and Sophie Davis. Riley and Ngaire Wills were at the other table with the Willcocks.

Parmenter started slowly, falling behind 22-0 after two boards, but the team managed a 4-IMP part-score swing on board 3, followed by this board:

O'Shea led the 48 to the jack and declarer's queen. There was no mystery in the deal at that point. Hocking had six diamonds, three clubs, two hearts and the spade trick she took at trick one. That was plus 490, a 10-IMP loss because at the other table the Willcocks bid the cold diamond slam for plus 920.

Three boards later, another swing went to Parmenter.

This board fell apart for Hocking in dramatic fashion.

O'Shea started with the ♥A, switching to her singleton spade at trick two. That went to her partner's queen and Hocking's ace. At trick three, Hocking tried to enter dummy for the trump finesse by playing a spade from hand. O'Shea ruffed with the ♣2 and, after some thought, put the ♠A on the table. When Parmenter showed out, O'Shea continued with the ♠2, covered in dummy and ruffed by Parmenter. The defense collected trick number five with the spade ruff and East-West recorded minus 150. That was an 8-IMP swing because at the other table North bought the contract at 3♠, taking only six tricks for minus 200.

That was it for the Parmenter highlights as the Riley squad took the set 45-26. Despite the outcome, the losing team remained positive as they looked forward to the eighth qualifying match of their event.

The Swedes had an excellent auction to Seven Hearts; after South's rebid to show 22-23 and Stayman by North, the latter player could agree hearts and cue-bid the diamond king. Now Blackwood by South found out the key cards were all there, and South thought she could count thirteen tricks if trumps behaved.

Nicola Smith as West led the spade jack and declarer won in hand and laid down the heart king, intending to follow up with the heart queen, since she assumed that the only 4-1 trump breaks that she could cope with were when West was long in trumps. So far so good, but under the heart king Nicola deposited the heart nine, which was the only card to give declarer a losing option. South was aware of the possibility that Smith had made the technical play, but after due reflection she played a trump to the ace, and down went the slam. Since Britain would have lost the match had the slam made, that was probably the sort of insult that Smith would be prepared to put up with all day long.

### Common Errors – How to Avoid Them - Failing to Listen to the Auction

Suppose you are dealt this hand:

**♦** K J 9 8 ♥ 6 4 3 **♦** K Q J 8 **♣** 8 7

You are in second seat as South and take part in this auction:

West	North	East	South
		1♠	Pass
1NT	Pass	2♥	Pass
3♥	Pass	4♥	All Pass

What will you lead?

Your powerful diamond suit is very tempting – but only if you were not listening to the auction.

Can you guess what declarer's hand looks like? What does the auction tell you?

Well, East started with five spades and has at least four hearts, and he thought his hand was good enough to accept an invitation to game.

What's the best holding in spades that declarer can have? Right: A Q 10 7 6, perhaps with one extra. Now, how about West? He surely has four or more hearts and frequently will have two or fewer spades.

You are sitting "behind" declarer, so you almost surely have three natural tricks in spades. Can declarer do anything about that? Sure, he can ruff his losing spades in dummy – if you let him.

By now, you have probably guessed that you should put that ♦K back in your hand and start off with a trump. If dummy has only four trumps and, say, a doubleton spade, you have probably hit on the killing lead. You will certainly get in with a spade, and when you do, you can play another trump.

Even if you don't defeat 4♥, in a pairs game the trump lead will very likely save an overtrick, which could be worth a lot of matchpoints for you against the players who, unlike you, were not listening to the bidding.

Occasionally you will listen in on an auction like this

If you are North, and fail to lead a club, don't admit it to your bridge friends. This is one auction where you will rush to do something you normally would not consider: leading an unsupported ace. On this occasion, however, if East or West had a club stopper – even just a doubleton AK – the contract would be 3NT, not five of a minor. If you have the A, lead it. Partner probably has the king.

On some bidding sequences, it won't be as obvious what to lead, but remember the words of the great Terence Reese: "There is no such thing as a blind opening lead – just deaf opening leaders."



West leads the K-4-4. Plan the play.



**Solution**: Contract: 5♣ by South. Lead♦K-♦2-♦4-♣2.

If you bid like this, you will need to play well and also have a healthy dose of luck. As you have a spade loser and a heart loser, you cannot afford a club loser. With ten trumps missing the king, the percentage play is to finesse in clubs. **K**-8 or **K**-5 with West is twice as likely as the bare **K** with East.

You might also be able to utilize the  $\mathbf{A}Q$ . At trick 2, play a low club and finesse the  $\mathbf{A}8$ . Phew! That hurdle is over. Now play a low spade. If East plays low, try the  $\mathbf{A}Q$ . If this loses to West, you will cross to the  $\mathbf{A}A$  and take the heart finesse. If the  $\mathbf{A}Q$  wins, you are home. Cross to the  $\mathbf{A}A$  and finesse the  $\mathbf{\Psi}Q$  for an overtrick.

In practice, East will rise with the A and switch to a heart. Take the A, cash the A, cross to the A and discard a heart on the A for 11 tricks.

Beware. When East switches to a heart, do not finesse the ♥Q! West wins and if he now shifts to the ♣K, it knocks out your entry to dummy with the spades still blocked.

## MASTER POINT PRESS BOOK OF THE YEAR


Australians did well at the 2017 IBPA Awards (see yesterday's Bulletin) with Sartaj Hans winning the Masterpoint Press Award for Book of The Year with his book, Battling the Best, My Journey through the 2014 Reisinger. The Reisinger is one of the three US National Tournaments.

This book is a personal memoir with loads of fascinating deals. Here's a sample:

Our opponents for the first two boards are the familiar faces of Sjoert Brink and Bas Drijver. They sit down at the table and shake our hands. In an environment where almost everyone is business- like, these friendly and good-natured guys are a rarity. Soon, I end up declaring four spades on these combined hands:

The lead is the heart three (third/fifth) and I win the queen in dummy as East follows with the five. It seems natural to draw trumps. Still somewhat groggy, I have some vague visions of retaining the jack of spades as an entry, so I play a spade to the ten, which holds. Regretting the choice in the spade suit, I cash the ace of hearts next and ruff the heart king. I notice that the two of hearts has not yet been played by either defender.



As I lead another spade. East wins while West discards an encouraging club. East switches to a club, West cashes the queen and ace and plays a third one as East ruffs with the queen of spades. I overruff and now face the position to the left.

With three tricks already lost, we need to guess the diamonds for our contract. What information do we have? Counting the shape, West has shown up with six clubs, one spade, and three or four hearts (depending on whether or not he has the two), giving him two or three diamonds. Twelve of his cards are accounted for; the last one is either the two of hearts or a diamond. His shape must be either 1=3=3=6 or 1=4=2=6. The former shape would mean diamonds are 3-3 and finding the queen is a total guess. The latter shape would mark East with four diamonds. In that case, the diamond queen is a favourite to be held by him because the person with length is odds-on to hold any specific card in a suit. The combined percentages thus clearly favour finessing through East, breaking even when the suit splits 3-3 and gaining mathematically when the suit is split 4-2.

Before committing to the diamond play, I play an extra round of spades. West discards a club and East the two of hearts. Great! Now the defenders' shapes are known as 1-3-3-6 West and

3-5-3-2 East. This is a 50/50 guess after all. Which way would you go?


Just my luck, I recall thinking. The whole board could swing on a blind guess that is totally random. The first board can set the momentum for the whole session so I scrupulously check the shape and high cards again. And then suddenly I have a breakthrough.

I was not entitled to the information that East held the heart two! He could easily have concealed that spot when I cashed the last trump. Had the heart two not appeared, I would have gone with my original assessment of playing with the odds and finessing through East. It was only after he volunteered this information that the situation became a 50—50 guess.

I eye East to size him up. This is Sjoert Brink, a world champion. A player who concealed the two of hearts on the second and third rounds of hearts. Should I trust him to be making a lazy play now?

No way! He is "helping me out" in my information gathering. I decide that the important information to take away from the heart two discard is not that diamonds are 3—3, but that East wants me to know they are 3—3. My despondence at the blind guess swinging a full board has switched to optimism. I confidently finesse through East and unsurprisingly, I'm right.

It was cunning play by Sjoert Brink. He may well have anticipated my likely problem, as the shape of hands round the table was known. He tried to help me along with the count of the hand. It was a devious deflective way to tempt me into a losing line of play. I'm glad I woke up in time! The full hand was:

From these qualifiers, 5 people will be drawn, and then a final draw from the 5 qualifiers will select the lucky person to play the TBIB "5 in 40" Card Lucky Draw. The person must be present at the draw to qualify.

**The Challenge** - There are 40 envelopes and in each envelope will be a coloured card. There will be 5 blue cards, 6 red cards, 9 green cards and 20 yellow cards. The lucky person begins by selecting an envelope and the coloured card will be displayed. They keep selecting envelopes and displaying the coloured cards until they have revealed 5 matching coloured cards. Once 5 cards of the same coloured are selected the game is over.

If they find 5 blue cards before they find 5 red, green or yellow cards then they win \$50,000. If they find 5 yellow cards first then they win a \$250 consolation prize and so.

**Finer Point** - Only one lucky person will have the opportunity to play the TBIB "5 in 40 Card" Lucky Draw. The 4 unlucky people in the final draw will win a consolation prize. The person must be present at the draw otherwise a redraw will be done. The envelopes will be prepared, sealed and provided by an independent insurance loss adjuster.
