To relieve the pressure on the Administration Desk at this time and to cut down on the queues, we are leaving the web site on-line entries open right up until Noon Thursday 21st February closing time for players wishing to enter and pay on-line by credit card.

You will still be able to pay at the Administration Desk using cash, cheque or credit card. Changes to existing entries (different players, changing events, cancellations etc.) will need to be done at the Administration Desk. Late entries and changes no longer incur a \$10.00 administrative fee.

So, avoid the queues, and enter online using your iPad, notebook or smartphone.

YOUTH, STUDENT AND OTHER CONCESSIONAL ENTRY FEES-ADVISE WHEN ENTERING

- In accordance with Australian Bridge Federation policy, all players born on or after 1st January 1994 are entitled to a 50% discount on entry fees.
- Courtesy of the Gold Coast Congress, all players born on or after 1st January 1999 (Under 20 years), or before 1st January 1919 (over 100 years) are entitled to free entry!

PARKING

Parking will be available for \$12 per entry per day or \$60 for a weekly pass with unlimited entry from Saturday 16th February to Saturday 23rd February inclusive.

The Bridge Administration Desk is the ONLY place you can obtain a weekly pass. It will be open on Friday 15th February from noon until 30 minutes after play. Weekly passes can only be used from Saturday to Saturday inclusive.

For those requiring casual day parking, a one entry one exit ticket will be available from the machine upon entry. Those parking will need to pay \$12 on departure at the pay stations which are located at the lifts as you are exiting. Note that the \$12 ticket is a one entry and one exit ticket so if you intend to leave between sessions you will be required to pay a second \$12 parking fee.

PENS

BRIDGEMATES

If you have never used the Bridgemate Scoring Units we suggest you arrive a few minutes before your first session and ask a Director for a quick tutorial. We are confident that your opponents will also help you to use this user friendly technology.

PLAYER NUMBERS FOR THE TEAMS USING BRIDGEMATE II

During the team events, when you turn on the Bridgemates, you will be asked to enter your player numbers. This is NOT your ABF number. Each player in every team has been assigned a number. These will be found on the bright orange sheet which will be on your table at the start of play. NS at the home table should enter the player numbers for the players in your own team.

The reason for this is that, if done correctly, the scoring team will produce a summary of the results for each pair in your team, comparing their results against the average score across your section on each board (the datum). These results have no official status and are just for your own interest. It is a service we are happy to be able to provide, but in order to take advantage of it, it is important that the player numbers are accurately entered each round.

Our observations from recent years show that over 90% of teams sit in the same seats for the whole event. To simplify the process for entering player numbers for these teams, from Round 2 onwards if your team is sitting in the same seats as in Round 1, you may just enter "1" for all four players. The unit will display "same as Round 1" as the player names and the system will correctly record the pairs.

WEB RESULTS PAGE

On the 2019 GCC Results Page, http://www.qldbridge.com.au/gcc/results2019.php (or if you hate typing like your editors https://tinyurl.com/y9nu3hjs), there is an option, "Individual Player Results." Click on this and enter your surname or ABF number (or anyone else whose results you may be interested in). You will now see a list of every session in which you played at the 2019 GCC, your score, the number of masterpoints won, and a link to your scorecard for the session. (This page will be updated at the end of each day's play).

CORRECTING SCORES

After each session, a printout of the results for each pair or team will be made available. For the last session of a stage of an event, you may obtain a copy on request from the Scoring Enquiries Desk located alongside the scoring room in the playing area.

If you believe that there is a mistake, you need to follow this procedure:

- 1. On the board where you believe that there was an error, agree with your opponents that the score was entered incorrectly;
- Make the correction on your printout and have them sign it;
- 3. Give the corrected printout to the Scoring Liaison Officer, Toni Bardon, under the sign "SCORING ENQUIRIES" outside the scoring room just inside the door in the centre of the playing area. She will check that you have provided all the necessary information. The correction will be made by the scorers during the following session and a new personal printout will be made available for you to collect.

Agreed scoring errors need to be advised within the scoring correction period for the session in which the error occurred. The scoring correction periods are displayed prominently near the scoreboards. At the conclusion of the scoring correction period, scores become final and, under the Laws of Bridge, no further changes can be made. This is critical for the last rounds when the correction period is limited and scorers may not pick up anomalies. You are responsible for your own actions - or lack thereof.

NEW The Scoring team may be advised of potential scoring errors via text to: 0487-062-138 (receives texts only, max 100 characters). Include the following information: Event, Session/Match, Pair number, Board number, Contract, Declarer, Score, What you believe is correct. The scoring team has a protocol to follow to determine if a result is manifestly wrong. You will be advised by return text whether the correction has been allowed.

If it is not accepted or if the error relates to the number of tricks taken, you will need to obtain written confirmation from your opponents as described above.

World Championships have been awarded based on scoring errors. E/W Pairs should not simply acknowledge the scores on the Bridgemate, but must check them carefully. Incorrect scores can change the result of an event even though the relevant pairs may have nothing to do with the scoring error. They may also affect: draws for Teams and Swiss Pairs events, Masterpoints, Playoff Qualifying Points.

SYSTEMS - WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

System regulations are published on the GCC website after 1 January 2019. http://www.qldbridge.com.au/gcc/2019/2019GCCSystemRegulations.pdf

Each pair is required to have two current ABF approved, systemically identical system cards on the table for the opposing pair before the start of each round. Overseas players will be permitted to use New Zealand and WBF system cards in addition to ABF cards. ABF system cards and guide to completing them are available at this site: http://www.abf.com.au/member-services/system-cards/

Subject to protection, **GREEN**, **BLUE** and **RED** systems as well as **BROWN** Sticker conventions may be used during the Open Pairs and Teams, Seniors Pairs and Teams, Intermediate Pairs and Teams, Mixed Teams, Friday Teams and Ivy Dahler Open Swiss Pairs, subject to protection. (Note: protection will not be available for the major final of the Open Pairs).

Only **GREEN** and **BLUE** systems may be used during the Restricted Pairs and Teams, Novice Pairs and Teams, Rookie Pairs, Friday Novice Pairs, Ivy Dahler Restricted Swiss Pairs and Under 50 Masterpoint Pairs.

YELLOW systems will only be permitted in the Open Teams from Round 3 onwards and not against teams with a current position in the lower two thirds of the field (decimals rounded up).

Teams proposing to use YELLOW systems should have already lodged an adequate copy of their system (including a bona fide suggested defence) with the CTD before 10:00am on Friday 5th February 2019. Such systems are available for inspection as well as posted on the GCC website using the information tab.

BROWN STICKER

Some overcalls and 2-level openings attract a **BROWN sticker**. Weak 2-level openings without an anchor suit (RCO and Myxo Twos, etc.) are **BROWN sticker**. Pairs should attach **BROWN** spots to their cards. Also, multi one-level overcalls are **BROWN**, though gadgets used over 1NT or a strong 1\$\mathbb{a}\$ are not. Please also note that a Multi 2\$\mathbb{\phi}\$ (or 2\$\mathbb{\phi}\$) showing a Weak Two in either major is an exemption from the **BROWN Sticker** category.

PROTECTED PAIRS

Pairs playing a **GREEN** system can apply for an Orange sticker if both are below Life Master or one is below State Master.

This affords protection from **BROWN Sticker** conventions in all events where they are permitted with the exception of the major Final of the Open Pairs.

ALERTS - SUMMARY

PRE-ALERTS

List your unusual or complex treatments in the pre-alerts section of the system card. For instance – RCO 2's, Bergen raises, DONT Dbl vs 1NT, unusual carding (leading low from doubletons, etc).

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Announce the number of clubs contained in a 1♣ opening and the HCP range of a 1NT opening. Those playing a strong club system just need to announce 1♣ as "Strong 16+".

ALERTS DURING THE AUCTION

Alert by circling partner's call and saying "Alert" but don't offer an explanation unless asked (then aim to be concise, yet complete).

DON'T ALERT:

- Any double or redouble
- Any call beyond 3NT, except a conventional opening bid
- A bid of a suit bid or shown by an opponent
- Any 24 response to a 1NT opening bid in an uncontested auction (e.g. Stayman)

For our New Zealand and international players: We do **NOT** use STOP Cards

DO ALERT:

All other conventional calls (such as *Transfers*, 2♥=hearts and *a minor etc.*)

'Unusual' natural bids. These include: weak jump shift responses, pre-emptive jump raises, inverted minors, canapé tendency, negative free bids, transfer accepts that deny four trumps, etc.

At the end of the auction, the declaring side should mark any unusual calls that weren't alerted at the time. Do this with a plus sign (+).

IF PARTNER STUFFS UP

Declarer/Dummy: If partner fails to alert or provides a wrong or misleading explanation, you should wait until the *end of the auction* before calling the Director and correcting.

Defenders: wait until the *end of the hand* before piping up.

INFORMATION FOR PLAYERS

Matthew McManus

In August last year, some new Laws of Bridge came into force in Australia. In many cases, the variations are of little practical effect. I have summarised some of the more significant changes that players may notice and need to know about. This summary is not intended as a complete description of the relevant laws.

Unintended calls

The opportunities to change an unintended call have been significantly reduced. An error which arises because of the player's loss of concentration as to the level of the auction can no longer be changed. This is the case even though the call may not be one which the player ever intended to make. For example, with spades agreed as trumps, West bids 4NT, Blackwood. East responds 5H (two without the queen). West starts thinking about whether to bid the slam or sign off at the five level. Eventually, he decides that 5S is enough, but this decision comes out as Pass. Even though he never intended to pass, he can no longer change the call to the bid of 5S he intended. (The same restriction will apply in other similar situations: for example, when a player passes an artificial Bergen-style raise.)

The same principle now also applies in regard to declarer's call of a card from dummy. Effectively, only legitimate slips of the tongue can now be changed. Loss of concentration or changes of mind are not viable excuses to correct. For instance, saying "small, I mean ace" will now mean that no change is allowed. The director can allow a change if he is satisfied that it was just a slip of the tongue. Potential allowable examples:

- 1. "king of hearts, I mean king of diamonds"
- 2. "small spade" while declarer is pointing at dummy's clubs

Calling the Director

It has always been a requirement in the Laws that the director be called whenever there is an irregularity. This has been reinforced in the new laws. It may become particularly relevant if, at the end of the auction, the

declaring side reveals that there has been incorrect information given about their bidding. If the players fail to call the director at the time and it turns out that the director could have done something to rectify it had he been called, then both sides are liable to get their worst possible score on the board.

The new law specifically states that ignorance of the law is no excuse.

Calls out of turn

Under the old laws, the penalties arising due to calls out of rotation could be very harsh. Often times, a player's partner was barred from bidding for the whole auction. Under the new laws, the partner can make his normal call. Depending on the action now taken by the player who originally called out of turn, the auction will either continue without penalty or the player's partner will have to pass for one round. The director will make a determination on a case by case basis using the guidelines in the laws regarding "comparable calls".

Claims

Previously when there was a claim, play stopped. If there was any dispute it was decided by the director. Now, play may be continued at the request of the non-claiming side provided all four players at the table agree. The result obtained at the table will stand.

DEFENCE IN DETAIL


Defence is one of the most difficult aspects in bridge, so the deals in this year's Bulletin series feature hands that have been played through congresses, national, and international tournaments! Don't worry, they don't involve trying to foresee and prevent declarer from executing a double squeeze at trick two or anything. In fact, these hands are always about trying to think about the *distributions* that will lead you to the right defence. In other words, bread and butter defence problems. Try them out without looking at the solutions too quickly!

When all looks well, it's time to check your sums.

Sitting East and playing matchpoints, you pick up the following and hear this auction:

Your partner leads a low spade and an unusual dummy comes down:



You might not have raised to 3♠ with only doubleton support, but that's not your concern.

Declarer takes the ace of spades and continues with a low club (you duck) to his king. The king and queen of spades draw all of the trumps (partner following) and declarer continues with the jack of hearts around to your queen. What now?


Seeing no particular need to play a club, you return a heart to declarer's ten, queen and ace. Declarer plays a third heart to his

nine (partner following up the line to show that he originally held an even number of hearts). Now comes a low club to partner's jack. How should you defend?

Declarer is marked with five spades and three hearts. With \$KQx, declarer would have led a second round of clubs towards his hand rather than playing this way, so partner holds \$QJx and declarer is down to two spades and three diamonds at this point.

Having worked this all out, it is easy to see that there is no pressing need to do anything on a double dummy basis. Partner can simply play a third club and declarer will be forced to play the diamonds himself. No problem, right...?

The full deal:



The hand looks a little different to partner after you leave them on lead. Unsure about declarer's distribution in the minors, partner is worried about playing a third club in case clubs are 4-3-3-3 around the table and the thirteenth club provides declarer with a discard (i.e. if declarer's shape is 5=3=2=3, playing a club will establish dummy's thirteenth club for a diamond pitch).

When partner eventually produces a low diamond, a cheerful declarer runs this around towards his ten to make his overtrick for +170 and a VERY good score. Nevertheless, if you weren't awake, it was you taking the blame for this sad outcome. All that was required was for you to overtake partner's jack of clubs with the ace and return a low club, thereby destroying any chance of a misdefence.

Point to remember: when you can see the winning line, take charge of the defence. Leave partner to guess enough times and they'll eventually guess wrong.

WELCOME TO NEW PLAYERS AT THE GCC

Welcome to the Gold Coast Congress. If this is your first as a newcomer, get ready for a great experience. If it's not your first, you have an idea about what you can expect, and you know you are in for a good time! To start you off on the right foot, here's a story to remind you that bridge is supposed to be fun.

In a light-hearted moment, a player asked his wife if she loved him more than bridge. "Of course," she said. "How about 7NT redoubled?" he continued. The wife thought it over for a minute then said, "Making?"

These columns are highlighting common areas where you may not have discussed with your partner that can potentially cause some confusion!

Have You Discussed? Part 1

I once played in a Swiss teams match against a team of experts. My partner and I were nowhere near the pair at our table in talent and experience, but we had an advantage: We worked hard on our bidding and knew our agreements very well. Our opponents were unfamiliar partners and had little time to discuss bidding. We ended up winning the match because our opponents had some bidding misunderstandings that costed them IMPs each time.

The point of this introduction is that if you and your partner work on your bidding and discuss important points, you will improve your results significantly.

In these articles, we will focus on an area of bridge play that is often overlooked – the nuances of the various conventions you play. You will see that it's not enough to mark Stayman on your convention card. As you will see, there's a lot more to it than that.

Now and then, I will start an article with an anecdote I hope you find amusing, partly to remind you that bridge is supposed to be fun. Some might not be relevant to the topic of the day, but they should at least be worth reading.

The late Harold Levitt had the kind of wit that usually hit the nail on the head. For example: "Playing bridge without a system is like winking at a girl in the dark. You know what you're doing, but nobody else does." If you and your partner fail to discuss your agreements thoroughly, you may find yourself winking in the dark.

For example, you may have decided to play a certain defence against the opponents' 1NT openers. In the U.S., Marty Bergen's DONT system has many followers, in part because of its simplicity. DONT is one of many schemes for competing against 1NT openers.

But what if the opponents are playing a "weak" 1NT? Do you use the same system? Many experts vary the system to be able to double directly to show a good hand (usually 14 or more high-card points).

Alert! Important point ahead!

Before you start thinking about an alternative system for "weak" 1NT openers, you and partner must define "weak." I have seen many experienced players using their weak 1NT takeout system when partner considered the opener to have been in the "strong" category.

Agree on the definition before you adopt a second system to compete against it. A range such as 10-12 is easy to define as weak, but what about 11-14? 13-15? What's best for competing is less important than agreement between you and your partner about the range for strong and for weak.

Another important topic for discussion is continuations by advancer (the partner of the overcaller). What if advancer has a good hand? Many pairs play that all good hands (i.e., worth opening bid) start with 2NT. This will come up more against the weaker 1NT openers but it's handy to have in your arsenal for all occasions. It's frustrating to miss a game because of the opponents' system.

It would also be helpful to discuss the kinds of hands you will have when you enter the auction. The Rule of 8, a guideline created by Mel Colchamiro of New York, can help. When deciding whether to enter the auction over a strong 1NT opener, take the number of cards in your two long suits and subtract the total number of losers in your hand (one loser for each missing ace, king and queen in a suit of three cards or longer; low doubletons have two losers, singletons one, voids none). If the answer is zero or one, pass. If the answer is two or higher, get in there. It becomes the Rule of 8 with the stipulation that the overcaller must have at least 6 high-card points to get involved.

While you are discussing competing against strong openings, decide on a defense to the artificial Precision 1♣ opening (or any strong 1♣). There are many gadgets for this task, but simple is best, at least at the start. The easiest to work with is Mathe: Double shows the majors, 1NT shows the minors. Other bids are natural.

Continuing with the thought, you can use the same defence against the strong 24 opener, but there is more risk involved because you have to start a level higher. The system chosen is less important than both partners' being on the same page.



Solution: **DOUBLE MEANING**



This deal was from a National Swiss Pairs.

Lead: ♥A

Declarer lost two hearts and a club for one down, -100. The datum (average) was E-W 100.

If you recognise East's double as Lightner, asking for an unusual lead, you can collect +500 from 5♥ doubled. A pre-emptor who doubles usually has a void and that should prompt West to lead

a diamond. The \$\,\text{8}\$, high card as suit-preference for spades, could produce diamond ruff, low spade to the king, diamond ruff. A for two down. Even diamond lead, ruffed, and two aces cashed is one down. Even on a spade lead, declarer might fail in 5♥ mispicking clubs. Moral: Avoid bidding five-over-five.

Helping children affected by domestic violence aet back to school

ZEPHYR EDUCTION INC

2019 GOLD COAST CONGRESS CHARITY

My name is Carmel Martin and I'm a bridge player and the treasurer of Zephyr Education Inc. For the third consecutive year, the QBA is sponsoring Zephyr as their charity to be supported at the Gold Coast Congress.

Zephyr Education Inc is a Brisbane based charity whose sole purpose is to help children, whose lives and education have been disrupted by domestic violence, get back to school as

quickly as possible by supplying: school uniforms and shoes; textbooks and stationery specific to the year and school they attend; school bags, lunch boxes, water bottles, headphones and other school items. Zephyr also supplies swimming gear and pays resource levies (e.g. for eLearning), camp fees and sports fees to make sure the children don't miss out on these important activities.

Many of these children arrive at domestic violence shelters with just the clothes they are wearing. It is vital for their self-esteem and continuing education that they fit in at their new school by having the same uniform, books and equipment as the other children. It is also an unfortunate fact of school life that children who stand out because they don't have the correct uniform have a higher risk of being bullied.

At the time of the GCC in 2016 Zephyr was supporting 16 Qld shelters. Zephyr currently supports the educational needs of children in 73 shelters and family services organisations throughout Queensland from the Gold Coast to Weipa and west to Mt Isa, Roma and the Downs.

Since February 2017, Zephyr has also been supplying school gear to children in Tasmania. In September 2018, Zephyr started helping children in 2 shelters in Perth with the intention of increasing that number as resources permit.

This charity is all about volunteers. <u>Everyone who works for Zephyr is a volunteer</u>. No one is paid to work or reimbursed for private expenses. After almost 6 years in operation, Zephyr is being regarded as a game changer. One shelter operator wrote:

"Your generous donations of school supplies, sports equipment, financial contributions to school resource fees and household goods are gratefully received by the families at the service crisis shelter.

Refuge can be a lonely and challenging time for families living in crisis accommodation. Your support assists us to alleviate some of the financial pressures that arise for families at this time. With your continual support we are helping families to get through times of desperate need that seemed hopeless, by giving them the support and encouragement they need.

Most importantly is the impact your support has on the children accessing our service. Your support enables children to transition to a new school with the appropriate resources they need that allows them to keep their dignity and self-worth, and minimises the risk of "standing out in the crowd". On behalf of the children who have benefited from your program I say thank you."

Your Support: As a bridge player, I turned to the bridge community for donations when we realized that the size of the charity was going to go beyond the boundaries of our two families and close friends. The support from the bridge community has been overwhelming, humbling and gratefully received. Apart from the hugely generous financial support we've received, we've been spurred on by the massive endorsement of what we are trying to do. I know I'm talking in superlatives but there are no words to describe the support we are receiving.

- we have a supply of pashminas and wraps so please just ask a caddy who will bring it to you we do ask that you return these to the caddy at end of the session; and
- if it is obviously too cold for you and those around you please ask the caddy to report the table number and section to Kim Ellaway who will bring her trusted thermometer to see if it can be fixed or perhaps we can move the table.

Things you can do that will **NOT** improve your comfort level:

- discuss the issue with a Director or the Scoring Staff
- · discuss it with the Recorder


