
Bridge with Richard Ward



West has a tough decision over 4S – to pass or bid 5H (double is not really a sensible alternative). In the recent Australian Mixed Teams play-offs (won by Queensland's Pele Rankin with Stephen Fischer/ Leone & Trevor Fuller), five pairs pushed on to 5H, some were doubled and all made 11 tricks. Seven pairs were allowed to play quietly in 4H. Six pairs were left in 4S, three were doubled and four made 10 tricks. Now for the defence to 4S. East led the seven of diamonds to partner's ace and received a ruff at trick two. West's diamond four return indicated a club entry so a club went to the ace and another diamond was returned. This allowed declarer to discard her club loser and the game was made. East-West were cranky about this outcome. "I led a low club back to you so you knew I had an honour" complained East. Well maybe, but East, who knows he cannot ruff a second diamond, should play the club king and another to avoid disaster. Blame East 100% for taking his eye off the ball.
