## Bridge with Richard Ward

The play of this hand contains a number of instructive points and traps for the unwary.

You reach the normal 3NT (via 1C - 1S; 1NT - 3NT) to which West leads the king of diamonds. Count your top tricks - three spades, two hearts, one diamond and two clubs equals 8 , with chances for the ninth in spades or hearts. Duck the first two diamonds and take the third which severs the link between East and West. You now need to keep West off lead. So, duck a heart to East and also duck East's return of the club queen. You have now lost four tricks. As you cash your two heart winners (no 3-3 break) and two club winners you find that, provided your brain hasn't imploded, you have an accurate count on West's hand two hearts, five diamonds and two clubs and hence four spades. Play a spade to the ace, and another to the king so you know that the spade finesse will work. Lead the two - you did play the ten of spades first to unblock did you not? - to the nine and the queen is your ninth trick. Well played!
