
Bridge with Richard Ward



West opens four hearts because she has an eight-card suit. In the absence of a firm partnership agreement, the meaning of North's 4NT overcall can be determined by logical elimination. If she held a spade-minor two-suiter she would probably have bid spades directly. If she had a strong semi-balanced hand, she would double and then the spotlight would be on South to decide where to bid a suit or pass for penalties. 4NT then must show a minor 2-suiter. South gets the message and bids her 'best' minor, diamonds. Now to the play.

West leads the two of spades. Where there be pre-emptive bids, there also be singletons. Declarer beware! Grab the ace of spades and lead a high diamond. East will take this and cash the king of spades. What should West discard? How about the king of hearts? This card will deny the ace and might force partner to look elsewhere for the setting trick. With no more tricks coming in hearts or clubs, all that is left is to try for a trump promotion. So, East plays a third spade which West, bless her cotton socks, ruffs with the nine of diamonds, over-ruffed. Now the ten of diamonds is the setting trick.
